- Review and refresh the whole school reading strategies – “Tactical Teaching of Reading” and the “Eagle and Wolf” strategies
- Embed a whole of school approach to Writing
- Maintain Literacy/ Numeracy coaches supporting all teaching staff
- Engage PBL tier 2 team and implement targeted strategies
- Maintain the Reboot room as part of an “internal suspension” and “suspension re-entry” process
- Upscale the opportunity for teachers to engage in Pedagogies for Deep Learning (PDL)

Providing Literacy/ Numeracy Coach support (Staffing)	\$ 94 000
Continuing PDL involvement in the Junior Curriculum – Resources	\$ 4 000
Employ Head of Department: HPE – to develop/ implement the Lifeskills program in the school	\$ 38 000
Employing Teacher Aides- In class support	\$107 555
Employing a behaviour support teacher aide (Positive Behaviour for Learning and Attendance focus)	\$ 30 000
Providing on-line learning opportunities for students in Literacy and Numeracy	\$ 10 000
